
Compliance Review & Survey

The Michigan State Historic Preservation Office Archaeology Program records, investigates, interprets, and protects Michigan's archaeological sites. A large part of these responsibilities are fulfilled through environmental review required by Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966.

Each year, SHPO reviews an average of over 4,000 federal undertakings. In 2024, 1,028 projects resulted in more than 13,500 acres surveyed for archaeological sites in Michigan. This work benefits communities throughout Michigan, with 421 new archaeological sites recorded in 52 counties (see map to the right).

SHPO continues to update the State Archaeological Site File, which will be soon accessible through the Cultural Resource Information System (CRIS) database. CRIS went live in June for SHPO staff and state agencies and online access for consultants and research should be available in early 2025. The entire paper records of the site file were sent out for scanning at the end of last year. Scanned documents are now being uploaded into CRIS.

Student Internships

This year, the SHPO was able to offer two internship opportunities in our office. The Archaeology Program offered a summer internship focused on Museum Studies. From June through July, Brittney Eastin, a graduate student at Wayne State University worked with the state archaeology collections, assisting SHPO



with an audit of collections loans and digitizing our loan documentation.

SHPO also received an internship to assist the Section 106 program. Lilly Ebarra, is a trained archaeologist and a graduate student of the Historic Preservation Program at Ball State University. She joined us in May and will be with our office until December 2024. She is assisting us with research requests, data entry, and environmental review.

Outreach & Education

SHPO outreach & education has focused on several new initiatives, as well as building on existing efforts to reach diverse audiences. In fiscal year 2024, SHPO archaeology staff gave over two dozen presentations and trainings throughout Michigan, serving many different communities and stakeholders (see map below). SHPO archaeologists give presentations on our research, SHPO services & programs, Section 106 & preservation law, or other heritage & preservation topics. SHPO released a <u>Traditional Cultural Place/Landscape form</u> in March 2024. This fillable form has been requested by consultants and Tribal Governments. The form is for reporting TCP/Ls that contain archaeological and/or architectural components, as well as ethnographically significant cultural landscapes.

SHPO continues the tradition of annual Archaeology Month posters. The 2024 poster features Traditional Cultural Places and Landscapes. State Collections & NAGPRA

SHPO is coordinating with the Department of Natural Resources-Michigan History Center for Tribal consultation on NAGPRA eligible ancestors & objects in the State Archaeological Collections.

We continue to conduct repatriations of the remaining ancestors in the State Archaeological Collections. Ancestors from Kerr, Bugai, Warner School, Leeson, Sterling Park Beach, and GL-539 sites were repatriated in November 2023. Repatriation of ancestors from the Sun and Snow Mound site was completed in October 2024.

In January of 2024, we published a revised summary of Unassociated Funerary Objects and sent notices to 54 Tribal Nations. Tribal consultation on these objects is currently ongoing and we seek to ensure appropriate duty of care until repatriation.
